

Alpha Tau earns seven chapter awards at 163rd Convention

Success and accomplishment were abundant for Alpha Tau at the 163rd General Convention in Kansas City this past August. The Nebraska Chapter brought home seven awards, including our eighth (six consecutive) Francis H. Sisson Award for superior chapter excellence and garnered the highly esteemed John Reily Knox Award for the second time in chapter history. Alpha Tau was presented the John Holt Duncan service award, recognizing our ongoing partnership and mentoring program with Hartley Elementary. The undergraduates also took home the Recruitment Program Award for outstanding efforts in the 2001-2002 academic year. Continued excellence was found in the areas of involvement and academics as Nebraska achieved our third consecutive Virginia Tech (highest overall GPA with a 3.4 and highest in region) and Campus Involvement Awards.

ALPHA TAU IS FIRST IN GRADES

Nebraska Chapter maintains academic excellence with a 3.51 cumlative GPA

For the spring 2002 semester the undergraduates of Beta Theta Pi posted a collective grade point average of 3.51, placing the chapter first among fraternities for the second consecutive semester. Alpha Tau was again well above the all-men's (3.052), all-fraternity (3.161), all-university (2.941), and all-Greek (3.227) averages.

The collegiate members attribute their academic success to careful selection in recruitment, superior facilities and resources, in addition to substance-free housing, all of which are conducive to the positive learning environment found within the chapter.

FOLSOM HONORED FOR SERVICE AND DEDICATION

On August 9th at our 163rd General Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, Brother Burton Folsom was awarded the Francis W. Shepardson Award.

The award, created to recognize exemplary devotion and dedication to the Fraternity, its objects and obligations, is named in memory of Francis Shepardson, *Denison 1882*, distinguished President and General Secretary of Beta Theta Pi. Folsom is one of only two Betas to serve in the top three leadership roles of the Fraternity; General Treasurer (1964-67), General Secretary (1967-71) and President (1987-1990).

Folsom currently resides with his wife Dell in Temple, Texas. Burton is seventh in an Alpha Tau legacy line, which includes Ernest Folsom *Nebraska 1898* and most recently Kent Folsom *Nebraska 1982*. Eleven members of the Folsom family are members of Beta Theta Pi at Nebraska.

FOCUS ON ALUMNI

The 163rd General Convention brought a second and well-deserved John Reily Knox Award to the men of Alpha Tau. On behalf of the Beta Theta Pi Foundation, let me offer our hearty congratulations. Something else from that Convention has the potential to yield even more for Alpha Tau in the years to come.

At the Convention, the Beta Theta Pi Foundation directors met alone and with the fraternity Board of Trustees to discuss an important initiative that is on our horizon. In the coming months, all Beta alumni and undergraduates will be learning more about the *Upon These Principles: A Campaign for Every Beta* that will generate financial support for Beta's three great principles.

This past year, the Foundation board and fraternity have conducted a feasibility study with the aid of professional counsel, and Beta's leadership has set out the mechanisms for conducting a multi-year capital campaign that will be unprecedented in the fraternity world. An ambitious goal will be announced at the 2003 Convention (Oxford, Ohio). At present we expect that about one-fourth of the campaign will fund our growth and the balance will fund our future. By focusing on three areas (Advisor Leadership and Education, *Men of Principle* Implementation, and Experiential Leadership Programs) the campaign aligns with Beta's three great principles.

As chairman of the Foundation Development Committee this year, I invite your involvements and look forward to working with Alpha Tau alumni and many other Beta brothers across North America. This October, I will travel to Washington DC to meet at the Capitol with US Senator Richard G. Lugar *Denison '54*, the honorary chairman of the campaign, at a working session.

The remarkable recent achievements of our chapter undergraduates, in combination with the rich history of Beta Theta Pi at the University of Nebraska, loudly signal the impact that *Upon These Principles: A Campaign for Every Beta* will have for Alpha Tau.
