

Alumni Support Needed to Wrap Up Active Phase of Campaign by December 31

The facilities of the remodeled and updated Alpha Tau chapter house continue to be fully utilized; 71 members live in the house. And the building is home to 112 men. Incoming freshmen don't always initially understand brotherhood and Greek life, but the chapter house is a positive point of consideration as they go through summer recruitment. Previous issues of *The Dragon's Tale* and our appeal for funds are available on the new Alpha Tau website, www.nebraskabeta.com. Since the campaign started, most but not all of our funds have been raised.

Please Help Us Out!

To complete our announced goal of \$3,000,000 (or more for a slight cushion), it would be great to have the campaign wrapped up by December 31. Pledges made to the University of Nebraska Foundation may be 100% tax deductible, and our chapter receives all of the funds directed to the Foundation. Checks should be made payable to the University of Nebraska Foundation.

Whether paying off an existing pledge, which reduces interest costs, increasing an existing pledge, or making a pledge for the first time—pledge forms and other valuable information are located at our website. Contributions can also be

paid to the Beta Theta Pi Alumni Association of Nebraska. *These are not tax deductible, but still help with project costs.* Either way, all pledges or additional donations are mailed to the same address on the pledge form.

Making a charitable contribution from an Individual Retirement Annuity may also be an option. According to an article in *Forbes* from December 20, 2015, Congress has voted to allow taxpayers over the age of 70 ½ to make an exclusion of up to \$100,000 per individual for IRA distributions given directly to charities.

UNDERGRADUATES STRIVE TO BE MEN OF PRINCIPLE

The Alpha Tau Chapter of Beta Theta Pi is excited about the 2016-17 school year and its promise of exciting developments. During the summer, the Alpha Tau Chapter continued its tradition of excellence with our record-high 14th Knox award along with the second-highest number of Sisson awards at 19. These are the two awards given during the Beta Theta Pi General Convention for chapter excellence. It was a sincere pleasure to accept these prestigious awards on behalf of the chapter at the 177th General Convention in Oklahoma City in August.

With the arrival of classes, we make sure to dedicate proper time to our academic pursuits thanks to Scholarship Chairman Riley Heller '15. A newly implemented scholarship team consisting of Jason Hawkins '15 and Alan Davis '16 will assist Riley in developing ways to boost our academic success. Our all-chapter GPA was a 3.383 for spring 2016, which placed us third among fraternities. Although we are proud of this average, we know we can do better.

I've truly enjoyed getting to know the members of the new pledge class, and I am impressed by the caliber and aspirations of these young men. They have reinstated a weekly 5K run in partnership with the kids at Lighthouse, an afterschool program founded by Alpha Tau alumnus Pete Allman '76. This is a distinct display of character, and I am proud of how they represent Beta Theta Pi. Without question, our recruitment success is due to Recruitment Chairman Kevin Wilhelm '15 and his assistants, Tanner Haas '16 and Gage Mruz '16. We now look to Pledge Educator AJ Carpenter '15 to be both a friend and strict mentor to the freshmen.

Although it hasn't been easy, Beta leads the way in the changing social culture of the university. Issues include a non-Beta fraternity pledge passing away a year ago due to alcohol-related complications; multiple sexual assault cases (not involving Betas); and notable protests in the name of equality have all caused dynamic interactions among students and administration. One of the major forces at work is Title IX, a federal amendment for equal

opportunity in school systems. In order to better equip our new members for this environment, new material has been added to the Pledge Manual that includes presentations on alcohol awareness, mental health, and sexual assault. The active chapter is also well aware of the significance of these programs. Following the theme of *The Bridge Builder*, it is imperative that we are part of the solution on campus—and leave a better campus to those who follow after us. Our plans to achieve success range from holding awareness events for the community to simply living the high values of Beta Theta Pi. There is also a bridge on the grounds of The General Fraternity office in Oxford, OH, that was built to fit that poem. Wooden Institute, a General Fraternity program for leadership development, has *The Bridge Builder* as a theme, and it is a point of the Men of Principle initiative that is the Mission Statement for all of Beta Theta Pi.)

Last spring, Mitch May '14 and I were initiated into Mortar Board, the senior honorary; we are proud and excited to represent Beta.

Finally, the active chapter is thrilled to officially kickoff the alumni/active mentor program. The project is the result of hours of hard work by **Bruce McKeag '65**, **Bill Dana '76**, and **Kaleb Duncan '15**. Active members reached out to their counterparts in late September, and pairs have already begun to meet. We're excited to see where these mentor relationships go and how it will positively affect the chapter. The November 12 luncheon was a great time to reconnect with Betas young and old and celebrate an amazing program. Thank you for all those who have given back to the chapter. We are so fortunate to follow the path blazed by men before us.

ONWARD AND UPWARD TO ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

An email sent by The General Fraternity on September 15 with the subject, "Raise the Roof: Top 40 GPAs," listed Beta chapters that were ranked first in scholarship standings at their universities. Unfortunately, Alpha Tau was not first on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus. However, this disappointment does not take away from Alpha Tau's long-standing excellence with GPAs. Our chapter GPA was 3.337 for spring 2015, 3.357 for fall 2015, and 3.383 for spring 2016. All these grade point averages rank first to third for fraternities at UNL. Our GPA last semester ranks favorably with other leading Beta chapters.

Grades continue to be of the utmost priority for all active members and pledges. Study hours are required three times a week for new members to ensure that their academic progress takes priority during the first few semesters of their undergraduate experience. Beta Theta Pi maintains an extraordinarily high academic standing at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and we work hard to stay there.

Grade reports for all pledges were received the first part of October to ensure that all pledges are in compliance with the requirements to become initiated members of the chapter. Should pledges not be in compliance with the academic standards of our chapter, they will be placed on academic probation until they can align their priorities with the rest of our chapter. This academic probation requires social probation and mandatory academic assistance in order to make certain these prospective members have the best opportunity possible to be initiated.

Overall, Beta continues to be a strong academic force at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. We plan to uphold our standards and maintain the integrity and values of this chapter of Beta Theta Pi.


1960s Betas Reunited This Fall

OUR MYSTIC SHRINE

Soren S. "Sam" Jensen '54 formerly of Omaha, NE, entered Our Mystic Shrine on September 17. While attending the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, he was editor of *The Daily Nebraskan*; vice president of Alpha Tau; and a member of the Innocent's Society, the senior men's honorary. Following his graduation, Sam was an infantry captain in the United States Army Reserve. He graduated from the University of Nebraska Law School in 1961, and worked for several Omaha law firms specializing in labor relations law. Sam was a prominent Omaha and Nebraska civic leader, and very active in numerous organizations and the Republican Party. He is survived by two sons, Soren R. and Eric; daughter Dana; three stepchildren; and four grandchildren.

Wilbur L. "Lee" Bentz '60 entered Our Mystic Shrine on September 23 as a resident of Brainerd, MN, and formerly of the Minneapolis area. Lee took Naval ROTC courses while at the University of Nebraska, and served on the nuclear ballistic missile submarine USS Woodrow Wilson. He liked to tell the story of his interview with Admiral Hyman Rickover, who directed the development of nuclear powered ships in the U.S. Navy. The interview was a prerequisite for all officers serving on a nuclear sub. Lee retired from his position as an investment advisor with VALIC in 2006. Lee described himself as an avid outdoorsman, and he and his wife lived in a cabin in the woods near Brainerd. He is survived by his wife of 32 years, Norma Jean; children, Mark and Kara; and stepchildren, Terry Watschke, Douglas Reynolds, and William Reynolds.

John R. McVay '67 entered Our Mystic Shrine on June 11, 2006, as a resident of Lincoln, NE. He worked for several human services organizations in his professional career, and was deputy director for behavioral health services for the State of Nebraska at the time of his death. John is survived by his wife, Cathy; four sons, Joshua McVay, Zachary McVay, Jason Watkins, and Joshua Watkins; and seven grandchildren. One of the key benefits of this direct charitable contribution is that this would count toward the Required Minimum Distribution. The gift can satisfy a pledge that was made as long as one does not receive anything other than an intangible religious benefit for the contribution. The charity must provide an acknowledgement stating the amount of the charitable distribution and that no goods, services, or benefits were provided. If this is something being considered, we would strongly suggest talking to your financial advisor or accountant, and if proceeding, make certain the contribution made to the University of Nebraska Foundation includes a reference to the "Beta Theta Pi Charitable Fund."

A special note to those brothers who made an original pledge but have either not made a payment or are behind in the schedule of payments—please make plans to get caught up. We have had an excellent collection rate to this point, and want to continue that rate until all pledges have been received as initially established.

Please think of what Beta and Alpha Tau did for you, and help us provide that experience for current and future undergraduates without any debt.
