uring their respective childhoods, Michael Nikunen '76, David Nikunen '80, and Robert Nikunen '85 lived all over the world with their father serving as an Air Force officer. However, when their dad was stationed at Strategic Air Command (SAC) at Offutt Air Force Base, the Nikunen brothers found a place nearby that they could always call home.

Michael, Dave, and Bob all attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where they all went on to pledge Beta Theta Pi. Their legacy at the Alpha Tau Chapter started when Michael joined as a second-semester pledge.

"Beta recruited several friends from my high school that I thought very highly of and they encouraged me to join, so I was impressed with that and felt I might fit in and meet their criteria. The first year as a freshman was pretty difficult, but as I got to know my pledge brothers better, I saw something special developing in those relationships," Michael said. "The commitment to each other and the chapter was engaging and inspiring. We all realized there was something there bigger than us that we believed in and wanted to grow."

While the Nikunen brothers never lived in the chapter house at the same time, Dave and Bob were able to experience the Beta house while in high school when they would come to visit. "I always liked being part of a team, and Beta took it up to the next level," Dave said. "Through

Michael has moved out west to Bainbridge, Washington, and is a Vice President at Collective Health. Even though Michael misses not being able to attend as many Beta alumni events as he would like, he is still connected with the chapter through The Experience Company.

"I've enjoyed being part of the mentoring program with **Erik Goodwin** '18, who is a wonderful young Beta with a great future!" Michael said.

Retired Navy SEAL, UNL Alumnus Jack Riggins, Gives Guidance to Betas

ormer Nebraska governor and U. S. Senator Bob Kerrey remains well-known in our state. Before his political career, Kerrey was a U.S. Navy SEAL and was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor. Navy SEALs have been in the news the past few years due to their involvement in the capture of Osama bin Laden in 2011, the 2013 movie *Captain Phillips* that starred Tom Hanks and was based on a 2009 merchant ship hijacking, and the current CBS television series *SEAL Team*. The U.S. Navy's SEAL acronym stands for Sea, Air, and Land teams. The SEALs are the Navy's primary special operations force to operate in all environments.

On March 12, our chapter welcomed retired Navy SEAL and UNL alumnus Jack Riggins to speak at the chapter house. Commander Riggins has a background in SEAL team training and military leadership, and currently works for a consulting business that helps rebuild teams and

leadership styles. He gave a great presentation with topics such as mental toughness, his Navy SEAL leadership background, and what really matters in life. He provided examples of SEAL team fraternal bonding, gave advice for our upcoming graduates, and explained the values of the Navy SEAL team. 
