CHAPTER COUNSELOR REPORT


The summer of 2022 and the start of the school year has presented another year of great experiences for this group of 107 undergraduates in the Alpha Tau chapter. Over the summer, the whole house was very involved in the recruitment of another great class of Beta men. In August, our chapter was well-represented at the Annual Beta Convention, held this year in Atlanta. Our chapter received an award for our GPA being well-above the all-men's average. We also received an award for Alumni Engagement, which was a direct result of the involvement of The Experience Company with our mentoring program, and helping the men obtain internships. Within the first month of the school year, each new member had a 30-minute strength coaching session to discuss how his Top-5 Clifton Strengths can be leveraged to have a successful Beta and career experience.

Beta continues to be a leadership lab for the men in the chapter who demonstrate self-governance. The 11 members of the executive team work closely with the advisory team as they make decisions. Examples would include hiring a house director, hiring a food service company, establishing the new member education program, leading discussions on diversity, equity, and inclusion, and planning all the social and philanthropic events during the year.

PHILANTHROPY REPORT

s the chapter welcomed 34 new members, our philanthropic efforts remained top of mind. We are continuing to help at Lighthouse, a safe after-school environment for students in Lincoln with a focus on getting students to graduate high school by tutoring, playing games, and serving meals on occasion. (Lighthouse was founded by alum **Pete Allman '76** and his wife.) As a chapter, we aim to volunteer at Lighthouse on a weekly basis at a minimum. We helped the Friendship Home in their 20th annual "Safe Quarters" event by raising over \$1,100 on October 9. New Members went door-to-door to benefit this Lincoln organization helping victims of domestic violence.

We have two additional events planned this semester. Our next event was November 5, when we had a food truck at the house to help aid in the construction of the new Bryan Health April Sampson Cancer Center in south Lincoln. Throughout the last four semesters, fraternities campus-wide have been working together to fundraise for Bryan Health with the goal of \$150,000. Each fraternity has been given a financial goal based on the number of members in the house. Fraternities that reach their goal will have their crests permanently displayed in the cafeteria of the new Cancer Center.



Scholarship Report

A fter a disappointing fall semester of 2021, I am proud to report that, in the spring semester of 2022, Beta Theta Pi finished with a 3.46 house GPA. This is a tremendous improvement from the previous semester's GPA of 3.28. We had 16 members achieve a 4.0, and 48 made the Dean's List in their respective colleges.

Juniors led the way with a class-high GPA of 3.53, freshmen with an average of 3.49, sophomores with a 3.47, and the senior class with a 3.31. This spring, we also introduced a new scholarship, the David K. Karnes Leadership award. As the name states, this award commemorates former U.S. Senator **Dave Karnes '68**. The award is given to a current junior in their spring semester and chosen based on outstanding character and leadership. Congratulations to **Jarod Fox '20** for being the inaugural recipient of this award.

The previous fall semester, many incoming freshmen struggled to adapt to their college classes, contributing to a dip in grades for our entire chapter. This semester, we have instituted new practices to help the new members transition to more rigorous college classes. In the past, we had done

grade checks three times throughout the semester. However, modern-day students can quickly view their grades on their phones, so we are now doing grade checks every week. By doing this, we will quickly identify which new members need help and provide it to them.

Potential new members will also post their class schedules outside their rooms to improve class attendance and spark conversations regarding classes with initiated members. Finally, we will make the new members' exam scores public to the chapter. The goal is for those doing well to be celebrated and recognized for their efforts, and the active chapter will identify those struggling to provide assistance and encouragement. I expect these new practices to deeply instill the importance of academics into what it means to be an Alpha Tau for this new class.

This semester, we have just two members on academic assistance by falling below a 2.9 for two out of the last three semesters or below a 2.6 for one semester.

While we were excited to see the improvements from this semester, the chapter and I know that we have the potential to do even better.

DRAGON'S TALE

ALUMNI NEWS

"Bugeaters" is a group of "more mature" Betas that hold periodic events. This year's celebration was in Kansas City on October 18-20. Bill Pohlman '59, Don Stokes '59, and Gary Hruby '61 provided the following history of the group: Bill was traveling to Auburn, NE, in the 1990s. Flying into Kansas City from North Carolina, Bill saw a sign in a field saying something like "Re-elect Judy Stokes County Treasurer." Judy was the wife of Don, and the Stokes' lived in the KC area. Bill, Don, and a few other Betas met for lunch the next time Bill was in KC and started thinking about a gathering of a few brothers for a little golf event in North Carolina. Bill stated that Gary introduced the Bugeaters name from the University of Nebraska before "Cornhuskers" was first used in the early 1900s. One of the attendees, Tom Colwell '00, said he would like to do something similar the following year. The rest is history. During the next few years, Tom and his wife, Gwen, hosted beautiful events, and it grew to 40 or 50 people at one time in their backyard in Denver. Obviously, it has been held at various locations and hosted by numerous people, but Tom and Gwen should get credit for making it into something that has endured. This year, 13 participated, and while golf is no longer played, some good KC barbecue and cold beverages provided a great background for stories that have lived on with this group.

Packard began ministering as a transitional/interim pastor and has served three congregations, retiring from the United Church of the San Juans in Ridgeway, CO, on November 6. At press time, he stated he plans to occasionally fill the pulpit for vacationing pastors, although he's also been contacted by area churches to fill interim positions; so "retiring" has quotes around the word, "As I'm far from retiring."

Jack has a Mechanical Engineering degree from UNL. He is the founder of Corral Technologies, which has developed an electronic system to help farmers manage their pastures without building fences. When Jack was growing up, he spent time on his family's cattle farm in northern Nebraska. His father asked, "Wouldn't it be great if there was invisible fencing for cattle?" Jack said, "That's what started the idea." As cattle are rotated through pastures, Jack has developed a process to replace what was labor-intensive and hazardous. What started as a collar-and-ear-tag system is now an all-collar system that emits an electrical stimulation, much like dogs have. Boundaries for pastures are marked, and there is mapping software to create new fences in pastures. Farmers know the location of their cattle and can move cattle from one spot to another with the click of a button.

Last year Corral Technologies was the grand prize winner in the UNL College of Business New Venture Competition and was awarded a \$25,000 grant.
