# CHAPTER PRESIDENT REPORT

The University of Nebraska-Omaha now has a Beta colony, joining UNL and Creighton as Nebraska members in Beta's broad domain.

Another group of members joined me in attending our annual Experience Company retreat hosted by **Grant Gregory '60** at GlenArbor Golf Club in Bedford Hills, NY. Over food, drink, and golf, we spent considerable time discussing the continual growth of the chapter and The Experience Company. (See the separate report from The Experience Company.) We also heard from legendary former Pittsburgh Steelers coach Bill Cowher as he shared insight on lessons he learned on leadership. We are very grateful to Grant for hosting this phenomenal experience.

We had our inaugural Parents' Weekend on October 20-21. Active members' parents were invited to a formal event at Pinnacle Bank Arena on the evening of October 20, enjoying each other's company with music and drink. We reconvened at the chapter house the following morning for a tailgate and our annual Parents' Auction. Many then headed to Memorial Stadium to watch the Cornhuskers beat the Northwestern Wildcats. We are excited about the opportunities to invite parents into our "Beta lives" and share some of the great things happening at Alpha Tau.

Finally, I would like to thank my executive team for their help during this term. Each has simplified my life by exceptionally fulfilling their positions. From them, I have learned so much about myself: how to lead and get the best out of those you work with. To the rest of the chapter—actives and alumni—it has been an honor serving as your president. ### CHAPTER COUNSELOR REPORT

The first semester of the 2023-24 school year for the Beta men began with an activity that is now in its ninth year, so maybe it is almost a tradition. Gallup Inc. has developed an assessment that helps determine the strengths of individuals. Gallup has studied the topic based on the results of over 31 million people from all over the world who have taken the assessment. They identified 34 Strength Themes, and from the assessment, the Top 5 for an individual are ranked as the most likely to be used when interacting with others and completing tasks. This fits the vision of StrengthFinder founder Dr. Don Clifton for strength-based organizations to focus on what people do well. *Editor's note: Dr. Clifton, a Nebraska native and UNL graduate, was chairman of Gallup, Inc. from 1988 until his retirement. Upon his death in 2003 in Lincoln, Gallup and the Clifton Foundation donated \$30 million to UNL to create the Don Clifton Strengths Institute.* 

Each new member takes an online Strengths assessment at the beginning of their first year. Every individual in the new member class had a coaching session with me early in the school year—a conversation about their Top 5 Clifton Strengths. This began in 2015 when The Experience Company was beginning to implement many of the activities that have become part of the success of our organization—like mentoring and internships. At that time, I was asked to become a Certified Strengths Coach and conduct a coaching session with each new member.

In the time I have been conducting these coaching sessions, I have learned about individual new members and about the group of men who make up the undergraduate chapter. 301 men have taken the StrengthsFinder, and we notice trends. The most common strength is **Competition** (likes to win). The next four are **Achiever** (hard worker who completes tasks), **Futuristic** (visualizes what can be), **Restorative** (problem solver who fixes things), and **Adaptability** (can adjust to people and situations). It is easy to see from being around the chapter that those Top 5 themes fit and describe our chapter.

During our coaching sessions, each member discusses how he uses his Top 5 to be successful academically, how these Strengths help him be a better Beta, how he can grow in his leadership skills, and what this all means as he travels the journey along his career path. It is reassuring to hear how these young men can articulate and share their thoughts about their future. In many cases, they chose Beta because they believed being a member of our chapter gave them the best chance to maximize their Strengths and be successful in their careers. Many members have shared discussions they had with Betas during the recruitment process that were very different than the conversations at other fraternity recruitment events—and was the deciding factor in their decision to join Beta.

Because my number one Strength is **Individualization** (listening to understand each person's story), I have been honored to be able to spend time with these outstanding young men. I have heard their individual stories, their goals, and their hopes for their careers in the future. I also meet with each new member a second time in February, after they have completed one semester of college. In that second meeting (which will be a total of 602 individual meetings), we continue to discuss how they can use their strengths to the fullest advantage as they move along their career path.

I'm glad I'm a Beta, and I'm glad they are all Betas, too.

n July, several board members of The Experience Company (TEC) traveled to GlenArbor Golf Club in Bedford Hills, NY, for our annual retreat. The food and golf were wonderful, but our focus for the three days was planning our continued support for Alpha Tau chapter. To those with a valid email address, our annual report was sent on August 2. The report is also available on the chapter website, and we would strongly encourage you to read about our efforts at <a href="mailto:nebraskabeta.com/tec">nebraskabeta.com/tec</a>.

Much of our discussion centered around the three distinct priorities that contributed to our underlying mission and recent success. The first area of focus included the creation of a platform providing the Alpha Tau recruitment team with a vetted list of high-potential incoming freshmen who are attending the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. This will further enhance our ability to consistently recruit an outstanding new member class, and one incoming freshman from this platform joined Alpha Tau this year.

The second area included the establishment of an internal Customer Relationship Management (CRM) database and digital communications platform. This will enable TEC to effectively support the vast network of alumni, business leaders, parents, active members, and recruits.

Our third key area of focus has been the establishment of six \$1,000 science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) scholarships for incoming new members of our chapter. The creation of these scholarships allowed the recruitment team to have another effective resource at their disposal during the latest recruitment season. A highlight of the Parents' Weekend reception included awarding seven \$1,000 scholarships to current new members, thanks in part to The Experience Company. Six new recruitment scholarships---along with the pre-existing Men of Principle scholarship---were introduced this summer to help attract high-potential candidates to the house. The scholarships were awarded to the following (hometowns listed on page 3): Aden Williams, (Men of Principle), Fletcher Kelly, Will Blatchford, Owen Crone, Aiden Makovicka, Jacob Hyder, and Tyler Alexander.

The Experience Company is also working on future funding for additional scholarships. We are giving five years' worth of naming rights on future \$1,000 scholarships to alumni or specific pledge classes. Additionally, a plaque will be placed in the chapter house with the individuals or classes that provide donations for these scholarships. This focus, along with the recruitment enhancements, will improve our ability to recruit and develop the highest quality students on campus.

Going forward, our key priorities will include supporting and improving the quality of our existing mentorship and internship programs, capitalizing on our latest recruiting enhancements to further entrench the chapter as the top fraternity on the UNL campus, and increasing engagement with Alpha Tau alumni and parents.

This final priority is perhaps the most crucial of them all. We believe that a fraternity should not be an organization that a person joins for just four years and then quickly dismisses the importance of the fraternity as they enter the work environment. Rather, engagement should be a lifelong foundation and network that supports an individual in all that they do. Likewise, there is significant opportunity and potential in connecting parents of Alpha Tau chapter with alumni, creating opportunities to collaborate both personally and professionally.

Our ninth group of mentors and mentees were matched in September. More than 150 different Alpha Tau alumni have given of their time and talents for our mentor program.

# Scholarship Report

In spring 2023, Alpha Tau chapter achieved a cumulative all-house GPA of 3.54, securing the second-highest GPA on the city campus. (The first-semester GPA was 3.57 for the entire chapter.) Our commitment to intellectual excellence is unwavering, and we have recently extended our efforts to emphasize professional growth. At this summer's General Fraternity convention in Dallas, Alpha Tau was presented with a Virginia Tech Award for Academic Excellence.

This semester, as part of our bi-weekly study hours, our first-year students will have the opportunity to participate in an event led by a résumé specialist. This individual will conduct a seminar-style workshop to enhance our freshmen members' job marketability.

This summer, the scholarship team has been working with the new members to improve their initial schedule, as the active chapter has been rating professors and classes internally over the past two semesters. Our desired outcome is to improve the new members' college experience and help build the foundation for future semesters.

This year, we will continue weekly grade checks to help improve new member GPAs. These checks allow the scholarship team to review each new member's grades and goals and enable conversations on improving academically throughout the year. In fall 2022, we found that some new members who fell short in their GPA struggled with mental health issues outside of Beta. In addressing these issues externally, the result will be a healthier new member class and a byproduct of better grades.

Last semester, we had the privilege of electing two outstanding assistant scholarship chairmen, Ethan Buso '22 and Will Wooden '23. I am immensely grateful for their invaluable contributions and dedication to the scholarship team.

# NEW MEMBER EDUCATION REPORT

e are off to a tremendous start of the year as the 2023 new member class has hit the ground running. Will, Nolan, and Joe recruited an exceptionally talented class interested in music, sports media, STEM, and other fields. These young men are energetic, driven, and eager to become the men into which they hoped college would develop them.



As is the case with all first-year college students, they have needed assistance learning to manage time wisely and stay on top of many moving pieces. Their academic performance has been superb to this point, and they are working diligently to keep pace. In terms of academics, they have one collective goal in mind: to beat the outstanding GPA of 3.68 obtained by last year's class.

The two new member education assistants (**Drew Gleason '23** and **Nathan Siy '23**), the scholarship team, and I have implemented fluid strategies for tracking their academic standing as the semester progresses. Such methods include weekly grade checks, a test board, and division of competitive teams of new members, each striving to achieve the highest group GPA. We are determined to drive the academic success of this class and excited to see the results at the end of the semester.

This year, the active chapter implemented a new, unique program into the new member process. UNL has recently begun allowing fraternities to accredit their new member programs. There are six fraternities that include this class in their new member program. Alpha Tau is the latest chapter to take advantage of this opportunity. The class is called an ALEC (Agricultural Leadership Education and Communication) course, and the Beta class is taught by **Pete Allman '76**. Started in the 1970s on east campus for students to learn more about emotional intelligence and leadership, it was so popular that it has now expanded to both campuses and been made available to all students.

For Alpha Tau, every Tuesday night, new members learn about values, goal setting, identity, communication, conflict resolution, diversity, and other dynamics that help create good leaders. After class, new members stay to learn more about Beta songs, lore, and how the class subjects tie into being Men of Principle. This is an excellent opportunity for our new members to earn college credit while doing the work Beta asks of them. We are incredibly grateful to Pete for dedicating his time to teaching the class, and we are excited for many more in the future to participate in this unique program.

We cannot wait for this year's class to experience more of Beta's long-standing traditions, including family pairings, Dynamo, and our Winter Formal. Thus far, they have expressed a strong sense of fulfillment with the opportunities Beta provides, with many of these goals being the reason they were drawn to our chapter during the recruiting process. I am ecstatic to have the opportunity to galvanize their transition to college and thrilled to witness their development as the semester progresses.



### Beta Parent Alliance

# WHAT MAKES NEBRASKA TICK

John "Stokes" McCollister '67 Talks Brotherhood and Public Service

s a moderate Republican, **John "Stokes" McCollister '67** appreciates the unique nature of the Nebraska Legislature, also known as the "Unicameral."

"When I would go to national conferences and describe our nonpartisan, one-house legislature with no caucus system, all the other legislators I talked to were envious," the former two-term state senator said. No such setup exists in the U.S. Congress or other 49 state legislatures, all of which are bicameral (two-house) systems.

With only 49 members in the entire state Legislature, John found it much easier to build relationships with his colleagues compared to larger, partisan governing bodies. In that sense, it's not unlike his college years with Beta Theta Pi.

#### FINDING THE RIGHT PEOPLE

John joined Beta as a freshman alongside his high school friends, thanks in part to then-recruitment chairman **Steve Hutchins '64**, who is still a great friend today. "Just like now, the men Beta pledged were high-quality folks—men of character," he said. "Being around those kinds of people was a good experience and made you want to excel in the things you did."

Alpha Tau held many social functions with Delta Gamma, which introduced John to his wife of 52 years. John is also grateful to the many alumni who are involved with the chapter. "I think it's one of the best chapters in the fraternity, and the awards we have received are testament to that."

#### **GETTING THINGS DONE**

The transition to a unicameral legislature took place in the 1930s, inspired by U.S. Senator from Nebraska George Norris's trip to Australia

(where the state of Queensland had a similar system). Although most of the state senators have a personal party affiliation, the Legislature is officially nonpartisan and limits members to two consecutive four-year terms. (John recently finished his second term due to term limits, and left office in January 2023.)

Another unique legislative function: with no majority/minority leaders blocking certain legislation, every bill gets a hearing. "In most states, one of the two parties runs the show—not so in Nebraska," John said.

John passed several major bills in his eight years as a state senator for Omaha, including a renewable energy bill that's resulted in over \$3 billion in renewable energy investments for the state, as well as a DACA driver's license bill, which enabled over 3,000 Dreamers to drive in the state. Prior to that, he helped run the family business, McCollister and Co., for 35 years. He also served five terms on the board of the Metropolitan Utilities District, which provides gas and water to the Omaha area.

#### **DOING GOOD WORK**

Having left office, John looks forward to volunteering and spending time with family. He's currently volunteering in development with Together, the Omaha food pantry. John has served as a mentor in Alpha Tau's mentor program, and mentored other young Betas interested in government throughout his career. "I hope my mentees have enjoyed the Beta association as much as I have."

He testified before the U.S. Congress on banking issues and was invited to Russia to discuss agricultural law to help modernize their farming practices. He made hunting trips to South Dakota in his 80s and reluctantly gave up horse training at age 90. John supported Alpha Tau's capital campaign to renovate our chapter house. In 2015, John and pledge brother J. P. Cullen (from Wisconsin) made a trip to Lincoln for a tour of the remodeled chapter house. Jim Hewitt '53 was in school after John and described himself as an "avid listener of John's when he talked about law school and the military." Jim said he "appreciated John's wisdom, and I would like to let people know what a fine Beta he was." John was also well-known to Grant Gregory '60 who noted that John "was my mentor as a young boy. He recruited me to Beta and came to my initiation ceremony at Alpha Tau. He was a great patriot...and we were the closest friends for life."

John is survived by his wife, Carol, and a daughter, two sons, and a son-in-law among other relatives. One son is **Grant Dean '83**, a Tau Sigma (Iowa State) Beta. (The other son is Jeff Dean, who went to college in Wyoming and lost his way as a Sigma Nu.)

William T. Greer '48 entered Our Mystic Shrine on September 7, 2022. He is AT 787. Shortly after Bill's birth, the family moved from Omaha, NE, to Falls City, NE. Bill and a younger brother attended UNL on ROTC scholarships, and Bill earned his degree in Chemical Engineering in 1951. Bill met Kathryn Graybill when both were undergraduates (Kathy said she was the only woman he ever dated), and they married in Lincoln in 1953. Bill was accepted at the University of Nebraska College of Dentistry in 1951 and graduated in 1955. After serving his military commitment, Bill and Kathy moved to Colorado Springs, CO, in 1958.

The couple had four children, and swimming dominated their time. (Bill was a swimmer at Lincoln High.) Their children took lessons through the YMCA swimming program, and Bill and another person helped kick this off the ground. Bill became a coach, and the growth

of the program drove the formation of the Colorado Springs Swim Team (CSST). By this time, Bill's dental practice was thriving. Through patient contacts, he pushed for the funding and construction of Colorado Springs' first municipal swimming pool. This became the center of CSST's program. This broadened Bill's network of swimming relationships, and Bill became certified to referee college swim meets. In 1968, the Olympics were held in Mexico City. Colorado Springs was selected for its altitude to be the home training base for all sports in preparation for the Mexico City Olympics. With Bill's referee credentials, he was selected to referee the swim qualification meets. Bill's passion for education was in his family's DNA and led to his election to the board of education.

To honor his mother's distinguished career in education, which included being elected as the first female school superintendent of the State of Nebraska and establishing the U.S. Department of Education under President Carter, Bill endowed the Dr. Edith S. Greer Distinguished Chair in the College of Education at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in fall 1991. Bill was president of the Colorado Springs Dental Society from 1969 to 1970.

He is survived by his wife of 69 years, Kathy, and four children.
